First a little context for our contest: We have an exhibit on the World's Oldest Known Joke Book

- Called the *Philogelos* a collection of jokes in ancient Greek
- Dates from the 4th century CE
- Sometimes jokes still seem funny sometimes they don't



Here's an example from the Philogelos: Joke 1 (The Lamp)

ΑΜ Σχολαστικός ἀργυροκόπωι ἐπέταξε λύχνον ποιῆσαι. τοῦ δὲ ἐξετάσαντος πηλίκον ποιήσει, ἀπεκρίνατο 'Ως πρὸς ὀκτὼ ἀνθρώπους.

An idiot asks a silversmith to make him a lamp. 'How big do you want me to make it?' the silversmith asks.

'Big enough for eight people to see by.'



And here it is presented as a comic strip:






One joke documented in the Philogelos is incomplete, though.

National Museum of Language Contest: Finish the Joke!

Here's a challenge for you – since the Philogelos joke #8 is incomplete, the National Museum of Language invites you to finish the joke. Tell us how YOU think this joke would have ended. We will look at all the entries and select what we think is the best ending for the joke. We will publish a completed version of the joke in cartoon form on the NML website and credit you for the ending.

NML Joke Contest Rules

- 1) Joke endings must be submitted by September 27, 2025.
- 2) Send your entries to the NML: info@languagemuseum.org, with the subject heading "Phil Joke 8 ending."
- 3) Include the name under which you want to be credited (first name only, first and last name, nickname) your city and state.
- 4) You may write your ending either as a prose paragraph (like the opening paragraph for this contest), or you may write it as cartoon dialogue that describes the action and dialogue panel by panel. Start with Panel 8. By the way, the character's name is Abderites.
- 5) Since the joke dates back to around the late 4th century CE, your ending gag should NOT include anything that would not have been known about at that time. The one exception to this is that you may use modern English instead of ancient Greek. No references to stuff like spring-triggered mousetraps, guns, drones, lasers, etc. If you are not sure if something would be allowable, send your question to info@languagemuseum.org with the subject heading "Phil Joke 8 ending question," and we'll tell you if your idea is usable.
